Browns Corner Bridge Authority Quarterly Report

Bridge Street paving project continues:

Browns Corner Bridge Authority work crews have resumed paving activity on Bridge Street following a period of adverse weather. Once the rains stopped, the hard-working crews resumed placing brick pavers on the foundation of compacted RCP (Recycled Concrete Paving) underlain by geotextile. The progress is encouraging.



Zoe Ahaghotu Bridge can be seen in the background. At right rear the ladder to the top of the stump of the recently felled large willow oak, site of the future Tree House, can be seen. The bed of compacted RCP can be seen extending beyond the brick pavers.

BCBA director, Grampa Sandy, predicts completion of this paving project in time for the opening of Browns Corner Camp 2021.

Browns Corner Lumber Company Quarterly Report

Browns Corner Lumber Company CEO, Robert J. Randall has revealed the acquisition of steel beams for the construction of a lumber drying rack. The steel, ten 4-inch I-beams and three 10-inch channels, was procured over the Internet using Craigslist. Pedestals of concrete blocks will support the beams which in turn will support the sawn lumber while air drying under a tarp.

During a recent drought The Stream practically dried up, providing an opportunity for work crews using heavy equipment borrowed from The Browns Corner Bridge Authority to dredge portions of the stream, removing aquatic weeds and fallen leaves and branches. As can be seen in this file photo, The Stream just upstream of Zoe Ahaghotu Bridge, has been cleared, deepened, and widened. Recent heavy rains have once again filled the stream.
